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1	Manson:	Commander Sergeant Manson.	
2	Bereki:	Hi, Sergeant Manson. My name's Adam Bereki, how are	
3		you?	
4	Manson:	Good, how's it goin' today?	
5	Bereki:	I'm doing well, thank you. I have a, uh, pretty	
6		complex situation, and, uh, wanted to know if you had	
7		some time to talk about it.	
8	Manson:	Uh, well, it depends. Uh, what can I help you with?	
9	Bereki:	So, um, the the	
10	Manson:	What's it well, what it's regarding, and, uh, give	
11		me the Reader's Digest version here real quick so we	
12		can figure out	
13	Bereki:	Right.	
14	Manson:	what direction we need to go.	
15	Bereki:	The Reader's Digest version is that, um, I need to	
16		make a complaint against a judge for, uh, taking	
17		nearly a million dollars without lawful authority.	
18	Manson:	Okay.	
19	Bereki:	And as a result of that judgment, um, there has been a	
20		fraudulent lien placed on my house in Costa Mesa to	
21		essentially take the property. And, um, I have been	
22		unlawfully suspended f as a result of the	
23		judgment, from, um, working in my profession, which is	
24		a general contractor, unless I pay the illegal	
25		judgment or declare bankruptcy. And so the gist of	



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what has happened is that the judge acted unlawfully and is taking my property. Which now I understand that maybe there no -- there may not be any criminal intent on the part of the judge, but the unlawful taking of my property has occurred, and my health and wellbeing is being threatened because of the not being able to work, and now my property is being threatened from being taken without lawful authority, so there's some -- there -- basically, in other words, the state has created a harm and danger, and so I'm coming to the police department because I've exhausted all my apparent remedies in the courts, and they're not doing anything to remedy the situation. So I need the police department to investigate my claims, and if they are determined to be valid and -- and verified, that some executive action come in to -- to intervene to stop this unlawful taking. Um, because if that doesn't happen, then the police could, and likely would become principals in the aiding and abetting of these crimes. So, um, I have already reached out to, uh, Santa Ana and the Orange County Sheriff's Department, and Santa Ana refused to, uh, even take a crime report, let alone do an investigation. And the Sheriff's Department, after I made a complaint, took a report, but then their investigator, uh, didn't do a



1		full investigation, and they closed the case. So
2		whatever the case may be, uh, the my rights and
3		property are still being violated and taken. And I am
4		unable to find any public official in the State of
5		California to do anything about it.
6	Manson:	So if I'm understanding you correctly, you were
7		involved in some manner of court case in which, uh
8		uh, who sued you initially? I didn't catch that part.
9	Bereki:	Okay, so initially, it was see th there was a
10		fraud that was perpetrated on me in the case, and that
11		fraud was, very simply
12	Manson:	Okay, let's let's not get there yet. So, my
13		understanding is is that whoever brought suit against
14		you somebody brought suit against you or some
15		entity, correct?
16	Bereki:	Correct.
17	Manson:	Okay. And so that that entity or that person
18		prevailed, uh, with in court, and you said that
19		you've exhausted, uh, all, uh, appeals? Is that am
20		I understanding that right?
21	Bereki:	Yes, you are. Yes, you are.
22	Manson:	Okay, so you so, you, uh, received a judgment. Uh,
23		you appealed that judgment, and it was affirmed in
24		in in appeal court?
25	Bereki:	Correct. And and both but there's a nuance to



this, is that both the trial and the appellate court affirmed the judgment without authority. So meaning like, you know, the -- the police can make a judgment, but that judgment has to be within the realm of their authority. Like they -- the -- the police can't do something illegal and then call that a valid judgment.

Manson: Mm-hmm.

Bereki: You see what I'm saying? So that's the issue, is that both courts made the same -- even if you wanna call it an error in law, they didn't have authority to do what they did. And as a result of that, they -- literally I was fined almost a million dollars for not having a construction license.

Manson: Okay.

Bereki:

Anyone who hears that is just -- it's outrageous, right off the bat. Um, it doesn't make sense, especially when the criminal, uh, penalty for the same offense is -- is a maximum of \$5,000. This, I think is 146 times that amount. So, um, the basis was that the cop -- the -- the -- uh -- uh, the judges were required to minimally apply all the protections of the Excessive Fines Clause. And number one, they have to take into account your ability to pay it. Number two, it has to be proportional to the offense. These types of things. They did none of that. Um, and so as a



result of that, what happened is as -- as -- there's a law that says that if you have a judgment against you as a contractor, um, that immediately your license becomes suspended or revoked until you, um, pay the fine.

Manson: Mm.

Bereki:

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Well, obviously I don't have the money to pay that, and number two, it's illegal. And so, um, I can't pay it because I don't have the money, and it's illegal, and so I -- I -- I haven't been able to work, or I've been r- -- restrained from earning a living in my profession as a general contractor for a -- since the judgment, or right after that happened. And my attempts have this far been, you know, of course to go through the court process that's in place to, um, get an effective remedy, and none of that has worked. here I am in this situation. So then I started going to the legislature, and I made complaints to, um, both my senator and assemblywoman, and they said they would do an investigation, and they've stopped responding to me, so I have no -- nothing's become of that. actually, the senator closed the investigation without doing anything. And so then I started going to the Executive Branch, meaning, um, police departments, um, to get help. They've refused to do anything that

would remedy the situation in that regard so far. also made a complaint to the Commission on Judicial Performance. They don't have criminal law enforcement authority, from what I understand, and they refused to investigate. I also called the DOJ, or I made a complaint to the DOJ. They said, uh, they refused to investigate and told me to contact the Judicial Council. And I've also made a complaint to the OC DA's Office Special Investigations Unit, and they've not done anything. So here I am, essentially with no effective remedy, and again, whether the judge committed a crime or not, is -- is -- may be an issue, but whatever the case, my property is being taken without lawful authority, and I'm -- I'm being, you know, this is my livelihood that's, you know, involved here. Manson: What, uh --Bereki: And --Manson: -- what property are we talkin' about that's, uh, that's got a lien on it? This is from the judgment? Bereki: This is, uh, my house in Costa Mesa. right by South Coast Plaza. Manson: What's the address?

Um, 6 7 so we're not gonna, you know, be able to do anything with you there, um, 'cause that's out of the scope of 8 9 authority. So --10 Bereki: Well, I -- I disagree with that, because --11 Well, you can disagree with it, sir, and I'm sorry Manson: 12 that you're in the situation that you're in, but this is a -- this is a -- a -- a civil court issue that 13 14 doesn't have, you know, any -- any remedy through law 15 enforcement. I mean, if we had a, you know, police 16 investigation started for every, uh, you know, um, uh, 17 decision that judge made that -- that somebody didn't like, that's -- that's not even within the (inaudible 18 19 -00:09:48). Well -- well, let -- let me -- let me differentiate 20 Bereki: 21 what you're saying here. There's a difference between 22 someone being unhappy with a judgment, even though 23 it's the law, and the judgment being made without 24 lawful authority and in violation of constitutionally 25 protected rights.

Well --1 Manson: 2 Bereki: That are easily verifiable. Well, (inaudible - 00:10:06), I said it's outside of 3 Manson: 4 the purview of the local police department to even 5 look at. So, the avenue that you've already told me that you've , uh -- uh -- uh, addressed, um, all the 6 7 way up through, you know, DOJ and, uh -- uh, judi- --8 judicial ethics, uh, office, and all the way up have -9 - have, uh, presumably, um -- because this is in their 10 purview, presumably they've looked at the facts of the case and determined that, uh, there's -- there's no --11 12 no further remedy where they're concerned, that you're not gonna get any further with, uh --13 Well, I -- I -- I --14 Bereki: 15 Manson: -- police departments. 16 Bereki: I wouldn't go so far as to make that determination, 17 because in many of the cases --Well I --18 Manson: 19 Bereki: -- they didn't -- they didn't investigate the claim. 20 Manson: Sir, I wouldn't go so far as to make that 2.1 determination. I can tell you very clearly, this is not within the purview of a local police department, 22 23 okay? So I'm -- I'm sorry, and I'm sorry for the 24 situation you're in, um, but there's -- there's nothin' that we can -- can do to -- to assist you with 25



2 process, to whatever end, and ultimately, that court 3 process ends somewhere. And the -- the final judgment is gonna be the final judgment. So you could continue 4 5 to, uh, you know, I -- my assumption is, is you haven't exhausted all appeals, um, within the state, 6 7 maybe locally in the county. But, um, that's --8 that's the, uh, theater where this is gonna be, um, 9 remedied, ultimately. But it's (inaudible - 00:11:45) 10 police department. 11 Bereki: Okay, so -- so if -- if -- I do hear what you're 12 saying. So if I'm 15 making a complaint to you, that due process has been 16 violated, and that I need police intervention because 17 my -- my --18 That's -- that's an issue for your attorney to Manson: 19 address. 20 Bereki: How is that not a police department matter? 21 That's an issue for your attorney to address within Manson: 22 the court system, within the civil court system, okay? 23 And then that -- and furthermore, that would be a 24 federal violation, if you're gonna assert that. 25 doesn't start at the local police department.
