Adam Bereki complaint to Lieutenant Crawford

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Crawford: Irvine Police, Lieutenant Crawford. 1 2 Bereki: Hi, Lieutenant Crawford, this is Adam calling you 3 Thank you for leaving a message. 4 Crawford: Hi Adam, how are you? 5 Bereki: I'm well, thank you. How are you? 6 Crawford: Good. How can I help you tonight? 7 Bereki: Um, so I'm calling with a bit of a peculiar situation, 8 and, um --9 Crawford: Okay. 10 -- I just wanna give you some hypotheticals if -- if I Bereki: 11 could before getting into the -- all the messy details. 12 Crawford: 13 Okay. 14 Um, but how would I go about filing a complaint for Bereki: 15 deprivation of rights, constitutional rights, by a 16 public official? 17 Crawford: Um, well, we certain --- certainly have a complaint 18 process here at the police department. We accept the 19 complaint in any way, shape, or form that you'd like 20 to make it. Um, some of the recommendations that I 21 personally like to make for, uh, for those that choose 22 to file a complaint are to present, um, what occurred 23 in a written format. We have a -- a pamphlet which, 24 uh, provides you some information about our 25 complaints, and also an area where you can write your

own narrative about what -- what you would like to, 1 2 uh, highlight as your complaint. We also -- uh, I 3 also recommend that, um, people choose to file complaints sit down and -- and, uh, perhaps type 4 5 somethin' out in a Word document, or just, uh, in a handwritten document. That seems to be the best way 6 7 for us to accept those and, um, really allow the 8 person to explain what -- what occurred. 9 Bereki: So, have you ever -- ever handled a complaint, 10 or do you know if there's a policy at Irvine for 11 handling complaints for deprivation of rights by 12 public officials? Crawford: Uh, we -- we have a policy for handling complaints, 13 14 and that is basically that we'll accept any complaint 15 that, uh, that anyone chooses to file. So, uh, your -16 - your topic here, um, might be a little bit unique, 17 but the fact that you wanna file a complaint is -- is 18 not necessarily unique. 19 Bereki: Okay. 20 Crawford: Um, we accept complaints all the time. 2.1 Bereki: So, now, um, I'll give you a couple more details. 22 Let's say that, um, I want to make a complaint about, 23 um, both a -- a criminal law violation --24 Crawford: Mm-hmm. 25 -- and deprivation of constitutional rights violation Bereki:



1 by a judge that was --Crawford: Okay. 2 3 -- acting and on -- on-duty, so to speak, with -- but Bereki: 4 without authority. 5 Crawford: Okay. Okay. 6 Bereki: And that this situation occurred in the courthouse of 7 Santa Ana, but that when I went to make a complaint to 8 the Santa Ana Police Department, they refused to even 9 accept a complaint. 10 Crawford: Okay. Yeah, that's uh, I think maybe what -- what 11 you're lookin' for is a report and not so much a 12 complaint. Um, it sounds like you're making, um, some allegations that maybe a crime occurred or an incident 13 14 worthy of documentation maybe occurred. 15 complaint, um, that I'm discussing is -- is a 16 complaint that is about one of our officers or one of 17 our professional staff members, or, um, you know, 18 usually these complaints come in when someone in the 19 public isn't happy with our -- the service that we 20 provide them. But, um, then --21 Bereki: Okay, yeah, so thank you for --22 Crawford: -- I'm hearing -- I'm hearing that maybe -- maybe, 23 uh, some all- -- allegations of a crime that maybe 24 occurred, or an incident that you feel like you would 25 like to have documented.



Bereki: 1 Yes. 2 Crawford: Is that correct? 3 Yes, but there are some other nuances, like I shared, Bereki: 4 the jurisdictional issues that are going on there that 5 there's other agencies, like let's say the City of Santa Ana that has, uh, jurisdiction because the 6 7 courthouse is in their --Crawford: 8 Yeah. 9 Bereki: -- their city. 10 Crawford: Yeah, but --11 But they are refusing to -- to stop the crime that's Bereki: 12 being committed on me. Um, they --Crawford: All right, well I can't -- I can't speak for -- I 13 14 can't speak for the City of Santa Ana and -- and their 15 practices. Um, again, I'm not entirely sure what, uh, 16 the interaction that you had with them entails. But, 17 um, as far as jurisdiction goes, your best bet with 18 the courthouse might actually be the Orange County 19 Sheriff's Department. 20 Bereki: I have the same situation with them. 2.1 Crawford: Okay, and they -- they refused to hear your 22 complaint, or? 23 Bereki: They -- they -- they did. So I went to the court, and 24 I spoke with a sergeant and a deputy there, and they 25 both said, "We're not doin' anything." So I called



their Watch Commander. 1 2 Crawford: Mm-hmm. 3 And he said, "I'm scheduling a -- a -- a meeting for Bereki: 4 you to come to the, um, to Headquarters and we'll take 5 a report." 6 Crawford: Right. 7 Bereki: Well, they took a report, but then, um, they didn't 8 fully, fairly, and impartially investigate it. So --9 Crawford: Okay. 10 -- um, basically, this crime keeps going on, and Bereki: 11 they're refusing to protect me and my property from 12 something that the state is doing unlawfully. Crawford: Okay. So --13 14 Um, and -- and I will share with you that I'm a former Bereki: 15 police officer and major fraud and forgery 16 investigator, so I know exactly what a police --17 Crawford: With what agency? 18 Bereki: Uh, Huntington Beach. 19 Crawford: Okay. 20 Bereki: So, I know what a crime and investigation report looks 21 like. 22 Crawford: Okay. 23 Bereki: So these people aren't doin' it. And, um --Crawford: Okay. 24 25 -- you know, I'm not -- I'm not talking about \$50, or Bereki:

even \$500. I'm talking about close to a million dollars judgment that, um, this judge did, and actually what's happened is after he did it to me, I found out that this has been a statewide crime spree, if you will, by these judges that's been going on for decades. And many people have been victimized by this, and they've gone to the courts, and they've gone to the legislature to say, "Hey, stop. What you're doing is not lawful and you need to make a change to this," and they're being shut down on every turn. So

Crawford: Okay.

Bereki: -- um, what I did is I went to all of the courts as well, and I told them about the i- -- illegality of it, and they're refusing to make any changes, and they just keep lying and covering it up. And I also went to my state assemblywoman and senator, and they both said that they would investigate it, and they have stopped communicating with me.

Crawford: Okay.

Bereki: So, um, I've also, like I said, gone to Santa Ana and the Orange County Sheriff's Department, and, um, I get it, that investigating a judge or, uh, is -- is -- is an anomaly, it's something different. But, um, you know, in my experience, the penal code -- like if you



just look up 484, which is the basic, uh, code for theft, it says, "Whoever shall do any of these things." It -- this is no, um, discernment about whether it's a judge or not. So, you know, my -- my basic thing is that I think the minimum duty that an officer would have would be to take a report and do an investigation, and ultimately if, you know, the DA didn't file it, that's -- that's on the DA, that's not on the Police Department. Um, but none of these departments seem to be -- they're doing little bits and pieces of their duty, but it all seems like they're scared of investigating judges, and so they shut it down.

Crawford: Okay.

15 Bereki: Um --

Crawford: Well, I -- I hear your frustration, Adam, and I can tell you that this doesn't sound -- sound like it involves our jurisdiction, and unfortunately with it being in Santa Ana, and then also havin', uh, a court system fall within the county, Orange County's responsibility. Um, it does sound like from what you're tellin' me, a report was taken and they have arranged for you to -- to meet with them, um, that I would maybe recommend seein' that through and seeing what you -- what you, uh, learn from that meeting.



- 1 | Bereki: Oh, oh, that's already happened. It's long gone.
- 2 Crawford: Oh.
- 3 Bereki: Yeah, that's what I'm saying.
- 4 Crawford: All right, I -- I thought that was -- I thought that
- 5 was pending.
- 6 Bereki: No, no, no. Th- -- that's already -- that's already
- 7 long -- and that's what I'm saying is that they --
- 8 they -- we ultimately did meet and they took an
- 9 information report, but then didn't do, uh -- uh, any
- 10 thorough investigation. Um, and so it just got shut
- down before --
- 12 Crawford: Mm-hmm.
- 13 Bereki: -- anything was really truly looked into.
- 14 Crawford: Yeah.
- 15 Bereki: Um, and I -- and I hear you, but --
- 16 Crawford: Have you tried to speak to the DA's Office?
- 17 Bereki: Yes, I actually did talk to them, and they said go to
- 18 your local police department and have them make a
- 19 report.
- 20 Crawford: Okay.
- 21 Bereki: So --
- 22 Crawford: And you're in -- you live in our city, is that what
- I'm -- I'm assuming that --
- 24 Bereki: No, I -- I'm calling you because I have called these
- other agencies that are -- have ordinary jurisdiction



there, but they're not doing anything.

Crawford: Okay.

Bereki:

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They're not doing what they have a duty to do, and so, um, as I see it, and I -- I -- I know we may disagree upon this, the penal codes apply throughout the state, and so do the constitutional protections, so I -- I --I know again, this is a -- a unique situation, but I don't think that it's legitimate to say, "Hey, uh, well, we're a neighboring city. Even though the other cities may or may not be in dereliction of their duty, we're just gonna -- we're not gonna do anything." Um, especially under the -- the word "exigent circumstances" is coming to mind. It's, um -- because there is a, um, an exception to the situation. I mean, it's -- it's not like I haven't gone to Santa Ana and the Sheriff's Department yet, I have. And, um, you know, I -- I definitely would be willing to share all of the information that I have about what has transpired there, and, you know, evidence that there has been an -- an obvious dereliction of duty. Um, but a- -- again, yeah, so I'll -- I'll leave it at that.

Crawford: Okay. Yeah, um, you know, I -- I don't wanna say that, uh, you know we -- I think what you said was that you're reporting it to us, being that we're a



neighboring agency with an expectation that we somehow intervene and thoroughly investigate this, is that correct?

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W- -- yes, given the fact that -- that, um, I'm making an allegation, and I will give you the evidence of it, that they are being derelict in their duty to fully, fairly, and impartially investigate, both the criminal complaint and the, um, deprivation of rights complaint, and also the fact that because the state has created this injury, they also now have a duty of care to, uh, intervene to stop the behavior from going I -- I mean, it's kind of -- like this is -- this is not an apples-to-apples comparison, but it- -- it's gonna be pointing in the direction of what I'm talking about. Like let's say that in the George Floyd incident a -- a judge saw what was going on and said, "Well, oh, sorry, this is the Judicial Department. can't order those officers to do anything, um, they have to deal with it themselves." That's kind of like what I'm saying is going on here, is the Executive has a duty to oversee that the law is faithfully executed. And so there is a supervisory responsibility that is inherent in the duty of the Executive Branch to make sure that if the Judicial Branch goes out of line and usurps its authority that there is a check and balance



to that. And that's what I'm talking about here, is now, because the Judicial Branch has usurped it's authority and they're harming me irreparably, that the Executive Branch has to come in and stop the harm.

Um, because legitimately, I can also show you the complaints that I've made to the legislature and other branches of -- of the court. They're not doing anything.

9 Crawford: Okay.

Bereki: And so everybody that I've contacted is just -- I

don't know what they're doin', but let's just say,

putting their head in the sand or pointing the finger

at someone else.

Crawford: Yeah.

Bereki: Mm.

Crawford: Well, I'm sorry -- I'm sorry that that's -- that's the feeling that you have. I just wanna let you know though that the Irvine Police Department has no real jurisdictional boundary over this. It sounds like you've started the, you know, started in the right direction with the Sheriff's Department. It sounds like this thing is, uh, that things that you're alleging are -- are -- are big, and you might wanna consider getting a federal agency involved. Um, but tonight I don't have really, unfortunately, much to



1 offer you. 2 Bereki: Okay. So -- so your -- your determination is that 3 there's -- uh, even given the circumstances that I 4 gave you, there's no -- you -- you would not have any 5 -- you would not do anything. Is that correct? 6 Crawford: That's not what -- I'm not saying that I won't do 7 anything. I just don't see -- at this point I don't 8 see how the Irvine Police Department, uh, would get 9 involved in this matter at this time because it 10 doesn't involve any of our jurisd- -- jurisdictional 11 issues or boundaries. 12 Bereki: Okay. And, um, and this is, you know --13 Crawford: 14 Bereki: So --15 Crawford: -- a pretty large thing that you're alleging, and, 16 um, and so, you know, I -- I recommend you continue 17 to, uh, contact the Sheriff's Department and the 18 Orange County District Attorney's Office. You've made 19 some allegations about the State, and things of that 20 nature. Um, you might wanna consider a federal en- --21 entity, uh, speaking to them. But there's noth- --22 nothing here that I have to offer you, unfortunately, 23 at the Irvine Police Department at this time. 24 Bereki: Okay. All right, thank you so much. 25 Crawford: Thank you, sir.

1 Bereki: Thank you.

2 Crawford: Have a good night.

3 Bereki: Okay, you too.

4 Crawford: Bye-bye.

5 Bereki: Bye-bye.



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
