- 1 Bereki: Good morning.
- 2 | Murillo: Hi, are you Adam?
- 3 Bereki: Hi, yes. How are you?
- 4 | Murillo: I'm good. I'm Deputy Murillo with the Sheriff's
- 5 Department. The reason why I'm here is 'cause --
- 6 Male: Hey, stop.
- 7 | Murillo: -- uh, I have this Notice to Vacate. Are you aware of
- 8 the pending eviction here?
- 9 Bereki: Okay. Are you -- are you willing to hear what's going
- 10 on?
- 11 | Murillo: Um, I kinda have an idea, um, of what's going on.
- 12 Bereki: What do you know so far?
- 13 Murillo: Uh, you tell me.
- 14 Bereki: Oh, okay. Would you like to come in and sit down?
- 15 | Murillo: Uh, I -- I'm just here to serve the documents. Um,
- are you -- so you're aware of the pending eviction
- 17 here, correct?
- 18 Bereki: Yeah, and it's totally unlawful.
- 19 Murillo: Okay.
- 20 Bereki: That's what I need to -- I need to actually report
- that a crime's being committed upon me.
- 22 Murillo: Okay
- 23 Bereki: I'm a former Huntington Beach cop.
- 24 Murillo: Uh-huh.
- 25 | Bereki: So I have a -- a bit of awareness about criminal law.



- 1 Murillo: Okay.
- 2 | Bereki: And I need to make that report to you that there's a
- 3 crime being committed as part of this process.
- 4 | Murillo: Okay, so I would refer you to the Costa Mesa Police
- 5 Department, because this is their jurisdiction.
- 6 Bereki: Oh, okay.
- 7 | Murillo: Um, as -- as far as the eviction goes, we just go off
- 8 of whatever the court documents say. Um, right? We
- 9 affect a court order, which is the writ that you have
- in hand right there.
- 11 Bereki: Right.
- 12 Murillo: Um, if the writ says that, hey, I have to return this
- property back to somebody else, then unfortunately
- 14 that's -- that's what I have to do. Um --
- 15 Bereki: Okay, so --
- 16 Murillo: -- it's called law enforcement, not law writing. I
- didn't write the law, I just have to enforce what it
- 18 is.
- 19 Bereki: Right. But you actually have to enforce what the law
- is, not unlawful orders.
- 21 Murillo: Mm-hmm.
- 22 Bereki: Right, so it's your duty, as a check and balance on
- 23 the entire system --
- 24 Murillo: Mm-hmm.
- 25 Bereki: To look into and make sure that whatever law that



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you're enforcing is actually valid law, and that the

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1		the home was sold and how this eviction process is
2		happening. And so, because I'm reporting that to you,
3		I feel, and I know that you have a duty to investigate
4		this. And so I I know that there are
5		jurisdictional issues, but you're here assuming
6		jurisdiction right now.
7	Murillo:	Mm-hmm.
8	Bereki:	So and you're actually the person that is serving
9		these orders on behalf of the court. So, hang on a
10		minute.
11	Murillo:	And so there there was a judge that said that, hey,
12		this property needs to be returned back to somebody
13		else.
14	Bereki:	Right, and I'm telling you
15	Murillo:	Who is an attorney and has a bar card, and has already
16		made that determination.
17	Bereki:	I don't care. I don't care about whether they have a
18		bar card or attorney or not.
19	Murillo:	Okay.
20	Bereki:	You and I have common sense, and we can
21	Murillo:	So you do need to be out in the next five days. What
22		are your plans?
23	Bereki:	Um, I haven't decided that yet.
24	Murillo:	Okay.
25	Bereki:	So so what I'm asking for you is I'm making a a



report of a crime to you. And I wanna know if you're 1 2 gonna investigate that crime, or you're --3 Murillo: So what crime are you, uh, alleging that has occurred? 4 Bereki: Theft, actually robbery. It's -- it's the taking of 5 property by force and fear. 6 Murillo: Okay. Um, I don't think a 211 has occurred here. Um 7 How would you know if you didn't investigate it? 8 Bereki: 9 Murillo: Because there's nobody else here. 10 Bereki: Uh, it's all being done by paper. 11 Murillo: That's not possible. 12 Bereki: It absolutely is. 13 Murillo: A 211's a crime against a person. 14 Bereki: Yeah, it's also a crime against their property. 15 it occurs --16 Murillo: Mm-hmm. 17 Bereki: -- by force. And if that force is being done on 18 paper, it's still force. It doesn't mean -- like 19 because they have filed --I don't think that's what the law -- how -- how the 20 Murillo: 21 law is interpreted. 22 Well, go look it up. I have looked it up, and that's Bereki: 23 what it means. Murillo: 24 Uh-huh, okay. Okay, um --

So -- so here's the deal. The other thing is you

referred me to, uh, the Costa Mesa Police Department. 1 2 They're refusing to investigate this as well. 3 Murillo: Okay. 4 Bereki: I can let you hear the audio recording of that 5 conversation that I had with them. 6 Murillo: I -- I believe you. 7 Bereki: Okay. Murillo: Yeah. 9 Bereki: Well, so -- so here's the point. I have no remedy, 10 either in the courts or with the police department, 11 who's supposed to be a check and balance on the 12 courts. Murillo: Mm-hmm. 13 14 Bereki: So, what am I suppose to do? 15 Murillo: So, I think what it is, and I'm gonna be completely 16 honest with you --17 Bereki: Yeah. 18 Murillo: -- is I think you're just not getting the answer that 19 you wanna hear, um, unfortunate- --20 Bereki: Okay, how would you know that if you don't know what 2.1 the situation is? You don't -- you haven't heard what the situation is, so you're making these 22 23 determinations. 24 Murillo: You just told me that you felt that the law -- that 25 was written, uh, unlawfully.



1	Bereki:	Right.
2	Murillo:	Or we were taking your property away from you
3		unlawfully.
4	Bereki:	But I haven't given you the circumstances that lead to
5		so that you can determine that what I'm telling you
6		is actually the truth or not. You have to make that
7		independent determination.
8	Murillo:	So that's not my job to interpret. That's that's
9		for the courts to interpret.
10	Bereki:	No, no. It's actually yours if I'm making a crime
11		report to you.
12	Murillo:	Where does it say in the law that I have to interpret
13		the law?
14	Bereki:	Okay, you swore an oath of office to uphold the
15		Constitutions of California and the United States,
16		right?
17	Murillo:	Uh-huh.
18	Bereki:	And I'm alleging to you that there are public
19		officials that are violating those rights.
20	Murillo:	Uh-huh.
21	Bereki:	And so you have a mandatory nondiscretionary duty,
22		pursuant to Article 1, Section 26 of the California
23		Constitution
24	Murillo:	Mm-hmm.
25	Bereki:	to protect my rights and property from unlawful



1		taking by government officials that are committing
2		crimes upon me.
3	Murillo:	So would it would it make sense that maybe I would
4		be in violation of a court order if I chose not to
5		affect something that's already been
6	Bereki:	Um, no. I wouldn't. Because if you make an
7		independent determination, right. You're an
8		independent being.
9	Murillo:	Yeah.
10	Bereki:	Right? You have your own faculties.
11	Murillo:	Uh-huh.
12	Bereki:	You make a determination, and you say, "Look I have
13		this order that, um, a judge gave me," and I
14		ordinarily I give respect to that.
15	Murillo:	Mm-hmm.
16	Bereki:	Right? Understandably. I'm with you on that.
17		However, in the course of this incidence, someone has
18		informed me that they believe that there are crimes
19		being committed upon them by this order, and that
20		usually is not what happens in my job. But now it has
21		happened.
22	Murillo:	Mm-hmm.
23	Bereki:	And so I need to look into whether that if what
24		that person is telling me is absolutely true or not.
25	Murillo:	Mm-hmm.



- Before I commit a crime on that person by executing an 1 Bereki: 2 unlawful order by the court. See the court can't do 3 anything itself. It has to rely upon you to carry out 4 that order. 5 Murillo: And we rely on the court for facts and information. 6 Bereki: Right. But it -- the -- it is your duty --7 Murillo: And so they ---- to independently verify that -- those facts and 8 Bereki: 9 that information before you use your office --10 Murillo: Right, and you used --11 Bereki: -- to commit a crime. 12 Murillo: And you used the term "civil." Or you used the term 13 "investigate." This is a civil matter. There's
- Bereki: But I'm reporting a crime to you. There absolutely is something to investigate.
- Murillo: Okay, then I would recommend that you consult an attorney and have them fight for you in court.

- 19 Bereki: I -- I -- I -- I'm telling you that that's the 20 problem.
- 21 Murillo: And have them try to overturn the matter.
- 22 Bereki: The problem is --

- 23 Murillo: 'Cause we only investigate crimes. We don't
- 24 investigate civil issues.
- 25 Bereki: But I'm invest- -- I'm reporting a crime to you, the



unlawful taking of my property by force. 1 2 Murillo: Okay. I'm not gonna debate what is a crime or what 3 isn't a crime with you. Um, I'm only here to inform 4 you, hey, you do need to be out by the date and time 5 listed on that paper. Um --6 Bereki: Or what? Or what? 7 Murillo: Or we have to remove you from the property. 8 Bereki: So you're threatening me to use force upon me to 9 remove me? 10 Murillo: It -- it's not a threat. We're just tellin' you and 11 advising you, like hey, this is what's gonna happen if 12 you don't exit the property. We have to do this, sir. 13 I'm sorry it's an unfortunate circumstance. If you 14 need resources, I'm more than happy to help find you, 15 you know, some, uh -- or provide you with a resource 16 pamphlet. I just have to go back to my car and get 17 it. Um --18 Bereki: No, I need -- what I need from you, as far as 19 resources --20 Murillo: And I'm telling you I'm not -- I'm not gonna take a 21 report for that. 22 O- -- o- -- okay, then get me someone who will. Bereki: 23 That's a resource that I need. 24 Murillo: Th- -- I'm telling -- so it sounds like my supervisor 25 might've already spoken with you.



- 1 Bereki: Yeah.
- 2 | Murillo: I'm speaking with you. Sounds like Costa Mesa spoke
- 3 with you.
- 4 Bereki: Yeah.
- 5 Murillo: Um, did you speak to the DA's Office?
- 6 Bereki: I did.
- 7 Murillo: And it sounds like nobody is going to take a report
- 8 for you.
- 9 Bereki: Correct.
- 10 | Murillo: I'm not -- I'm not -- I'm not here to tell you I'm
- gonna change my mind or to do it.
- 12 Bereki: Right.
- 13 Murillo: Just because, like I said, there's no crime. Um --
- 14 Bereki: How would you know if you haven't heard what the story
- 15 is?
- 16 Murillo: Because it's not a criminal matter. It's a civil
- matter. It's not our duty to -- to, uh, enforce --
- 18 Bereki: Are you high? Bro --
- 19 Murillo: Sir, okay, I'm not gonna sit here and, uh --
- 20 Bereki: -- if I come and take your property with --
- 21 Murillo: I'm not gonna sit here and be offended by you. Um, is
- there anything else I could help you with today?
- 23 | Bereki: No. No.
- 24 Murillo: Okay.
- 25 Bereki: You can -- uh, are you refusing to get me -- to



1 provide an investing- --2 Murillo: I am not going to take a crime report for you, sir. 3 Bereki: Okay, you're not gonna take a crime report. And 4 you're not gonna provide me with an executive official 5 who will investigate the allegations that I'm --6 Murillo: No. 7 Bereki: -- that I'm -- I'm attempting to make? 8 Murillo: No, 'cause I've already told you the two issues that 9 we have. 10 Bereki: Okay. 11 Murillo: There's no crime, and, uh, this is not our 12 jurisdiction. 13 Bereki: How can you make a criminal determination that there's 14 been a crime --15 Murillo: Who also lives here with you? 16 Bereki: It's none of your business. 17 Murillo: Okay. Is it just you two? 18 Bereki: It's none of your business. 19 Murillo: Okay. No worries, sir. Um, I'm gonna be goin' out. 20 Do you have any other questions for me? 21 Bereki: No. Have you been recording this conversation? 22 Murillo: Of course, sir. 23 Bereki: Okay, good. Um, I will get a copy of it. Can -- do 24 you have a business card?
